"The Travelling People of God"

Call to Worship: Leader 1

Wherever our father Abraham stopped on his travels he built an altar to worship God. We, too, are travellers – travelling on the journey of life. Let us, like him, offer sacrifices of praise to the God who travels with us.

Prayer of Adoration: Leader 2 Let us pray:

Introduction to the theme of the service: Leader 1

In our service today we are going to think about what God has to say to us through our experiences of travel.

Humankind, both peoples and individuals, has always been travelling. And even those who have never left the place where they were born will testify that Life itself is a journey of new experiences and sights that leaves us in a different place from where we started, for we ourselves are different. The hymn we're going to sing later reminds us 'we're a travelling, wandering race, we're the people of God' – and in our service we're going to reflect on what it means to be the travelling people of God. We'll think about the start of the journey, having second thoughts, help through difficult times, and our final destination. First of all, we listen to a story about the call to journey......

Old Testament Reading 1: Reader 1 - Genesis 12:1-10

Old Testament Reading 2: Reader 2 - Genesis 13: 1, 14-18 - 'Then.....

Comment: Leader 1

The time before the start of a journey may be a time of joyful expectation, but it can also be a time of uncertainty, as we step out into the unknown. This is true of much in our lives – every new beginning involves brave decisions, change and challenge. We call Abraham a great 'Man of Faith', because of his willingness to trust God as he, in obedience to God's call, travelled far from home, the familiar and the understood. But sometimes, on our call to journey, we are not so sure. The poet Robert Frost expresses the hesitancy and indecision that we often experience.

<u>Poem</u>: Reader 3 'The Road Not Taken' by Robert Frost Two roads diverged in a yellow wood, And sorry I could not travel both And be one traveller, long I stood

And looked down one as far as I could To where it bent in the undergrowth;

Then took the other, as just as fair.....
.....Oh, I kept the first for another day!
Yet knowing how way leads on to way,
I doubted if I should ever come back.

I shall be telling this with a sigh Somewhere ages and ages hence: Two roads diverged in a wood, and I — I took the one less travelled by, And that has made all the difference.

Prayer: Leader 2 Let us pray -

Lord, you have called us to love and serve you,
To walk beside you in trust every day of our lives.
Give us the wisdom to know where we should go and what we should do,
The courage to keep on walking and loving,
And the faith that will see us through life's journey. In the name of Jesus, Amen.

Comment: Leader 1

The decision is made! The journey is started! In our next reading, Moses leads his people out of the bondage of slavery in Egypt into freedom. But then the challenges of travelling – and the second thoughts – begin....

Old Testament Reading 3: Reader 4 - Exodus 17: 1-6

Reflection: Reader 1

Life in Egypt was pretty tough. Slavery was a life sentence of hard labour. The overseers beat us if we weren't or couldn't work hard enough. They also beat us to keep our spirits low - there were so many of us that, if we had united and turned on them, they would have lost their power. That is why they didn't want us to have any more male babies, and had them all killed at birth.

That was our way of life – a way of living death. But Moses, brought up in the Pharaoh's court, was able to think out of the box. He was appalled by the lives that the people of Yahweh, of God, were leading. He pleaded with Pharaoh to let us go, to let us walk away. God sent signs to show the Egyptians that he was angry with the way we were treated, and that we should be set free. Eventually Pharaoh capitulated. And so our long walk to freedom began. And after our initial joy and excitement, the grumbling started, too. We were angry with Moses. We were angry with God. As refugees we were hungry, thirsty and afraid, unable to see the end of our journey. We even began to look back with nostalgia on our life in Egypt. At least there we had had enough to eat and to drink. Could we really trust Yahweh to look after us?

Prayer: Leader 2 Let us pray:

Let us confess to our loving, saving God, the times on our Christian journey when our faith has faltered: when we have looked back and not forward; when our own needs and comfort have mattered more than anything else. Lord of the journey, we ask you, for Jesus's sake, to put us back on a right footing with you.

The Lord hears our prayer. Thanks be to God. **Amen.**

or with disability or chronic pain, for

In your loving mercy: Hear our prayer.

We pray for those who have lost beloved companions on the journey,

who struggle on alone burdened by grief, for

In your loving mercy: Hear our prayer.

Lord, on our journey,

we need a leader, we need provisions, we need signposts,

we need strength, we need courage, we need companions.
