Beyond Essentials

Chaplaincy Essentials is only an introduction and it is important to go on growing in our ministry as chaplains. There are a number of ways to do this and the suggestions here offer a few starting points for continuing exploration.

Join the network:

To keep in touch with what is happening in chaplaincy (including news of gatherings, training, conferences and resources), sign up for the Chaplaincy Everywhere e-news at www.methodist.org.uk/news-and-events/sign-up-for-e-newsletters.

Share good news:

Share a story from your chaplaincy through the Chaplaincy Everywhere e-news (150 words plus a picture).

Training and courses:

Specialist training courses are available in many of the different areas of chaplaincy work, and a number of these can be found on line. Welcome to Chaplaincy (fbfe/lsc) offers a training programme for chaplains in Further Education Colleges and is particularly helpful for those working in multi-faith teams.
